I. Locating Reliable and Relevant Sources

Although billions of websites are available to us on the Internet, not all that information is valid, nor should you settle for just any information on a given topic. You want the information you ultimately include in your writing to be reliable so your audience benefits from the information, and you want the information to be relevant as well. Not all information on a given topic is relevant to the point you are making. It's challenging to find information that is both reliable and relevant, but the following reading and activities will help you to make sure you know what information to use and what information to discard. As with the Writing Process, there is a process called the Research Process, and following the steps laid out in the following reading and practice activities will help to ensure that you are succeed when you need to locate information about a topic. The first tutorial video reviews the research process in general, but you will learn more about each step in the process as you move through the following activities. In this Unit, you will learn about the first 4 steps in the process listed below. In Unit 8, you will then learn the last step, documenting and giving credit to sources.

- Solidify Your Topic
- Plan Your Strategy
- Evaluate Your Sources
- Use Your Sources
- Document Your Sources

Incorporating Source Information

Once you have selected the most reliable source information that is also specifically relevant to your thesis and claims, the next challenge you face is how to effectively incorporate that information into your paper. Writers face many challenges when then do that, including:

1. how to avoid over relying on the source in general

2. how to rely less on quotes and how to instead paraphrase information

3. how to integrate the source information smoothly and effectively
